I am pleased to present the 2023 annual report for Donate Life Florida, marking a year of significant progress and achievements. Our journey this year has been characterized by innovation, growth, and renewed collaboration, all aimed at fostering organ, eye, and tissue donation across the state.

A major highlight of this year was Donate Life Florida's adoption of PowerBi and Microsoft Fabric. These powerful tools have enhanced our ability to visualize and analyze donor registration data, including demographic variables such as age, sex, and nationality. With these insights, we can better tailor our initiatives and campaigns to diverse audiences, ensuring a more inclusive approach to our mission.

We have also seen remarkable growth in support for the Let Your Light Shine program. Iconic locations such as Hard Rock Stadium in South Florida and Hard Rock Casino in Tampa illuminated in support, with the Biltmore in Miami joining for the first time. Continued light-ups at the Port of Miami and the Freedom Tower in Miami underscore the growing community engagement and awareness.

Donate Life Florida's return to in-person board meetings has revitalized collaboration among donor programs. These gatherings at donor agencies statewide allowed new representatives to learn from each other, showcasing their unique contributions to our shared cause. This face-to-face interaction has strengthened our collective efforts after years of remote communication due to the pandemic.

We continue to closely monitor our registry numbers. The Joshua Abbott Organ and Tissue Donor Registry data purge has resulted in a more accurate and representative database. While the number of registered donors appears to have decreased, this adjustment ensures we have a clearer understanding of our progress and challenges.

Lastly, our ongoing campaigns, such as the Driver's License Office Outreach contests, have successfully promoted partner engagement. These initiatives not only raise funds and awareness but also boost the morale of our dedicated partners who tirelessly advocate for organ, eye, and tissue donation.

In conclusion, Donate Life Florida has made significant strides this year, thanks to the unwavering support of our community, partners, and dedicated team. Together, we will continue to illuminate the path towards greater awareness and participation in life-saving donations.

Donate Life Florida (DLF) continues to make tremendous strides in sharing the importance of donor registration. In 2023, DLF reached more than 600,000 Floridians through education and outreach efforts throughout the state. We also celebrated a 122% increase in registrants since the DLF registry was launched in 2009.

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JOSHUA ABBOTT ORGAN AND TISSUE DONOR REGISTRY

TOGETHER, WE ARE BUILDING A LIFESAVING LEGACY FOR OUR COMMUNITY

Florida's organ, eye and tissue registry is named for Joshua Abbott, the recipient of a lung transplant who passed away in 2006. Abbott's story so moved the Florida legislature that, in 2009, Florida's Agency for Health Care Administration chose Donate Life Florida to create a statewide donor registry to increase enrollment and educate Floridians about donation.

As of December 31, 2023, there are 11,316,413 individuals enrolled in Florida's Joshua Abbott Organ and Tissue Donor Registry. This represents a 122.82% increase since July 2009 when the new registry was launched.

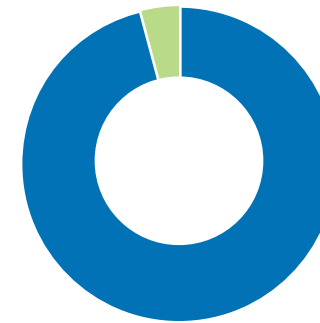

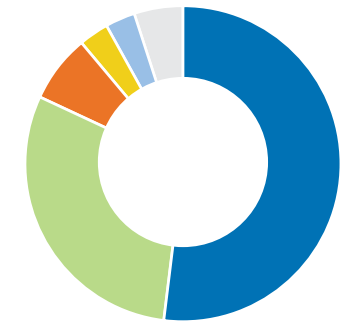


REGISTRATIONS BY SOURCE

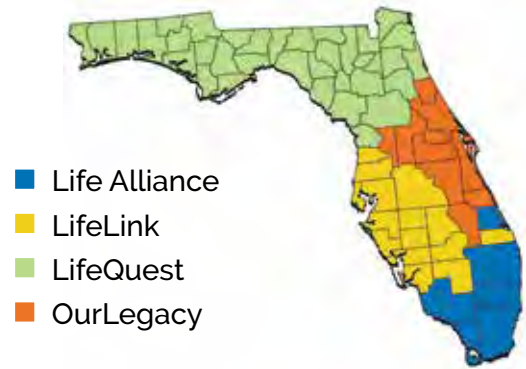
PROVIDING HEALING, MOBILITY AND RESTORED VISION THROUGH TISSUE AND EYE DONATION

The Joshua Abbott Organ and Tissue Donor Registry helps save lives. In 2023, nearly 43,000 lives were saved through organ transplants in the United States of America. Of those, more than 3,000 lives were saved by organs recovered in Florida.*

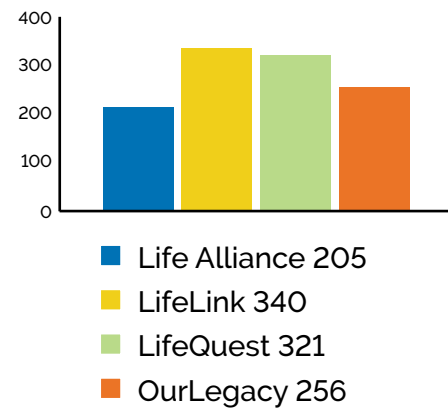

RECIPIENT AND DONOR STORIES



Marissa, Kidney Recipient

Marissa was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes as a child, meaning she had to take four insulin shots every day and often went to the hospital. When she turned 30, she started feeling very tired and short of breath. Doctors found out she had another condition called chronic inflammatory demyelinating polyradiculoneuropathy (CIDP), which is an autoimmune disease that attacks the body's nerves.

This disease made it hard for Marissa to walk, but she didn't give up. She used a walker to build up her strength and eventually walked on her own again. However, her kidneys got worse, and she

had to start dialysis in 2018 while waiting for a kidney and pancreas transplant.

Two years later, the day before her 35th birthday, Marissa received a call asking if she was ready for a transplant. On her birthday, she went into surgery and got a new kidney and pancreas. Marissa felt like she was born again. Now, she doesn't need insulin shots, and her CIDP is in remission.

Marissa volunteers with LifeLink of Florida and shares her story to encourage people to become organ, eye, and tissue donors. She is very thankful for her donor and their family for giving her a new chance at life.

Maureen, Lung Recipient

Maureen had always been active and healthy, so she was surprised when, in 2008, she started feeling very tired after just a short workout. When she noticed she had trouble climbing stairs at work, she went to her doctor. The doctor, concerned by crackling sounds he heard in her lungs, referred her to a pulmonologist. After many tests over the course of the next year, Maureen was finally diagnosed with idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis. This disease, which causes permanent scarring in the lungs, meant that Maureen needed a lung transplant.

Maureen waited nearly nine years for new lungs and finally got her transplant in 2017. Now, Maureen is more active than ever. She enjoys life

with her family, including her husband of 30 years, her two daughters, and her son, who she calls her "crown jewel." Maureen loves giving back to the community. She volunteers with LifeLink of Florida, Metropolitan Ministries, and the American Cancer Society. She also participates in adaptive sports with her son, who has spina bifida. They particularly enjoy archery!

Maureen is thankful for her faith, family, friends, and the medical team that helped her. But most importantly, she is grateful to the family of her lung donor. Their generosity gave her a second chance at life, and she lives every day to the fullest because of it.



Amber, Donor Daughter

Amber, an ICU nurse, has seen how organ, eye, and tissue donation can help families heal after a loved one dies. She considered her father, Kenneth, her best friend, and supported his decision to be a registered donor. When Kenneth passed away, he had the opportunity to give the gift of life. Kenneth's donation saved the life of a 28-year-old man who needed a liver transplant. Though Amber doesn't know this man, she hopes to meet him someday.

Amber and her brother honor their father's legacy by sharing his story. They also celebrate his love of family history and pride in their Scottish roots, which he taught them about throughout their childhood. They miss their dad very much, but they are grateful to the Donate Life community for the kindness and support they received during this difficult time.

Kenneth's donation has given his family a way to find hope and healing. Knowing that his gift helped someone else live has been a comfort to Amber and her brother. They see this as a bright spot in their journey of grief and recovery.



Krista, Heart Recipient

Krista, who grew up in Colorado, moved to New Orleans after graduating from college. In April 2003, when she was 23 years old, she started having severe chest pains. Far from her family, she was diagnosed with acute myocarditis, a rare complication of a viral infection. Despite cardiac rehab, Krista's illness led to congestive heart failure, and doctors determined she needed a heart transplant.

Luckily, after a short wait, Krista got a new heart. She felt a mix of emotions: sad for the donor's family but grateful for her second chance at life. Nine months after her transplant, Krista ran a 10k race to celebrate her new life and her motto: to live fully and make the most of every moment.

Krista loves to travel and has been to 49 U.S. states and 40 countries. She also enjoys paddle boarding, her latest hobby. She hopes to meet her donor's family someday. In 2023, Krista celebrated 20 years with her new heart, all thanks to the kindness of a stranger.



Makisha, Cornea Recipient

After receiving a cornea transplant 11 years ago, Makisha Odom, second from right, finally met her donor's family, the Hodges, at the Lions World Vision Institute this past April. Makisha had written them a letter and decided it was time to reach out. Her donor, Caleb Hodges, passed away in 2012, and his parents felt ready to meet the person he had helped. The meeting was very emotional, filled with tears, hugs, and laughter. Both families shared their gratitude and found comfort and love despite their loss. It was a day they would always remember.

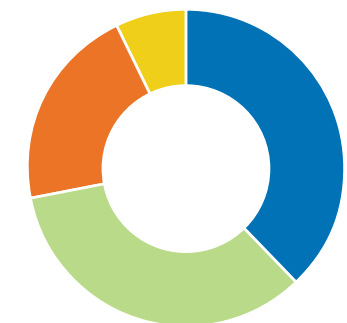

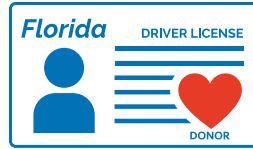

Department of Motor Vehicles and Tax Collector offices throughout the state leaped into action in April, decorating their workplaces with the 2023 National Donate Life Month (NDLM) theme of a frog on a lily pad. This theme was inspired by the natural world of a pond coming to life in the spring. Frogs (and toads!) are a sign of healing and renewal, and water lilies represent hope. The lily pads on the surface of a pond are part of a much larger plant rooted below the water. The water lily reminds us of the support and collaboration needed for hope to bloom.

As always, our partners and friends in driver license offices across Florida celebrated Donate Life Florida's mission and turned their places of work into works of art. Observed every April, NDLM signifies the importance of registering your decision to be a donor, honoring deceased and living donors, and celebrating the lives they saved. It is the generosity of donors and donor families that makes saving lives through transplantation possible.

In the United States, more than 100,000 patients are currently waiting for a transplant and more than 170 million people have registered their decision to be a donor. Driver license offices, not just in Florida but nationwide, play a crucial role in promoting organ, eye, and tissue donation and serve as stewards and representatives of the donor registry. 1,223 Floridians who registered or updated their profile online indicated they learned about the registry through a DMV or tax collector office.

HONORING OUR DONOR HEROES

Donate Life Florida donor programs honor organ, eye, and tissue donor heroes by hosting community-centered recognition ceremonies. These events serve as a heartfelt way to acknowledge the selflessness and generosity of donors and their families. They also highlight the importance of organ, eye, and tissue donation, inspiring others to consider registering as donors themselves. Recognition ceremonies often include the presentation of symbolic items, such as floragraphs (portraits made of natural materials, like seeds and dried flowers) or plaques, to commemorate donors' contributions. Additionally, these events provide an opportunity for donor families to come together and find solace in the support of their community. By organizing these meaningful tributes, Donate Life Florida ensures that the legacies of these donor heroes live on, while promoting the life-saving mission of organ, eye, and tissue donation.



Kayla Marie was a daughter, sister, and loving mother to two beautiful babies. Because of a reckless driver, Kayla's life was tragically cut short at the age of 23. To honor Kayla Marie's legacy, her mom and dad, Bernadette and Robert, worked with Orange County Commissioner Maribel Gomez Cordero to install a traffic light on Avalon Park Boulevard and Perdido Drive in Avalon Park, Florida, near the crash site where she passed. Kayla Marie, "is a hero," her mom said, because of her decision to register as an organ, eye, and tissue donor.

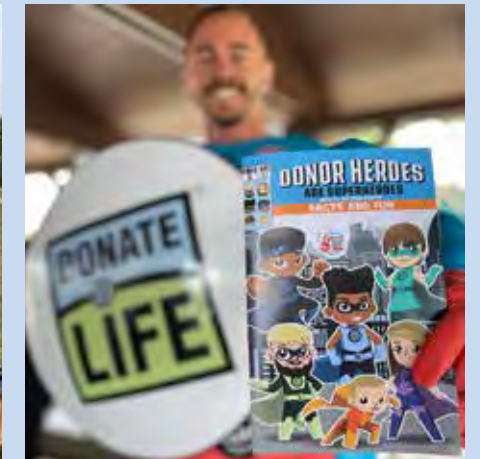

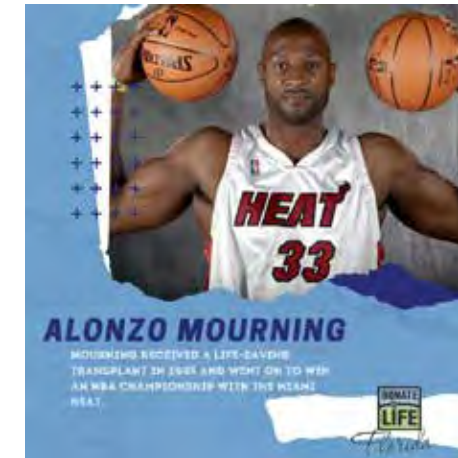

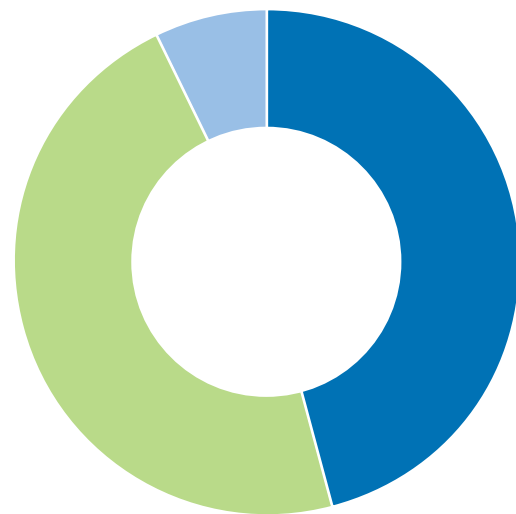
